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INTRODUCTION

SUDESCO intensive programme targets, through the design process, the understanding of the complexity of the coastal areas, in terms of environmental, social and economic sustainability. Coastal areas that have remained untouched as natural environments have suddenly become objects of debate regarding their "development" perspectives. On the other hand, built waterfront redevelopment, very often comes to a dead end, under long urbanisation procedures or various pressures for control and usage. Planning and design, in different range and scale, normally incorporates demands and needs of the preservation the function and the notion of the coast as the end of the sea or the end of land.

SUDESCO stresses sustainability as a critical filter for evaluating the design process for the coast. Sustainable design in coastal areas is considering environmental, social and economic issues in every stage of the design process. More specifically: Environmental sustainability: green structures (at construction and in use), microclimate, density and land use, mobility, green, water and waste. Social sustainability: experiencing the waterfront as a common good, maximizing the sea view, preserving public access and providing open public spaces.

Economic sustainability: energy consumption, minimizing intervention – maximising utilisation and efficiency of land uses.

SUDESCO proposes the "Ayia Napa" as a field for experimentation and application on these issues. The SUDESCO 2014 summer workshop will take place in Ayia Napa. Its coastal area is of a high environmental and cultural value dominated by a mass tourist industry. The extensive tourist development and associated infrastructure, during recent decades, has completely changed the identity of the coast, resulting in various conflicts at the spatial level, but also affecting environmental, social and d economic sustainability.

The structure of the workshop consists of four closely linked studios. Each studio adapts its deliverables on the visions of the local community, of how this area should be transformed.

- STUDIO I Refurbishment and tourism: Aims to re design the saturated built environments of mass coastal tourism.
- STUDIO II Cultural heritage and urban fabric: Deals with the contradiction between mass coastal tourism, recreation and preexisting cultural heritage sites.
- STUDIO III The coastline: Experiments on a fragmented and isolated coastline, regarding both its linearity and its connectivity to the fabric.
- STUDIO IV Green grid: Integrates
 the coastline and the fragments of green
 spaces increasing the environmental quality
 of the built coastal zone.

IDENTITIES OF AYIA NAPA

CURRENTLY AYIA NAPA IS IN A STATE OF FLUX.

SURVIVING ON THE MEMORIES OF ITS BUSY PAST, AYIA NAPA IS APPROACHING A CROSS ROADS IN THINKING ABOUT ITS IDENTITY (BOTH AT THIS MOMENT AND THE TIME TO COME) AS WELL AS PLANNING OUT THE ROUTES IT COULD TAKE FOR THE FUTURE.

ONCE ONE OF THE BIGGEST CLUBBING HOLIDAY DESTINATIONS IN EUROPE, THIS SCENE IN AYIA NAPA HAS BEGAN TO RECEDE GRADUALLY OVER THE PAST DECADE, WHICH HAS LEAD TO THE QUESTION - IN WHICH DIRECTION SHOULD AYIA NAPA RE-INVENT ITSELF? HOW WILL IT BE BRANDED TO BECOME A PROFITABLE AND RESPONSIBLE HOLIDAY DESTINATION, OFFERING A NEW VERSION OF THE "COMPLETE TOURIST EXPERIENCE".

THIS IS A VERY COMPLEX ISSUE WHICH REQUIRES AN UNDERSTANDING OF WHAT HAPPENS BELOW THE SURFACE OF AYIA NAPA; AN UNDERSTANDING OF THE MANY LARGER SYSTEMS, VISIONS, PEOPLE AND MOMENTS FOUND WITHIN THIS TOWN AND BEYOND.

SEASONALITY + SCALE

AYIA NAPA IS CURRENTLY A ONE SEASON TOWN, HISTORICALLY IT HAD AN ACTIVE LIFE ALL YEAR ROUND. COULD AN IMPROVED SEASONALITY BE KEY TO THE FUTURE OF AYIA NAPA?

FURTHERMORE, SHARING A SIMILAR FATE WITH OTHER TOURIST DESTINATIONS WITHIN THE MEDITERRANEAN WHICH ARE ALSO CRIPPLED BY THE RECESSION, AYIA NAPA NEEDS TO OBSERVE AND LEARN FROM THESE UNSUCCESSFUL PROJECTS. HOWEVER, HERE THE SITUATION IS COMPLETELY UNIQUE - ITS RE-INVENTION WILL NOT BE SOLVED BY ONLY BORROWING AND IMPLEMENTING EXAMPLES FROM THOSE OTHER TOURIST DESTINATIONS.

STRATEGIC THINKING

WHAT IS REQUIRED IS AN UNDERSTANDING OF ALL THE FACTORS THAT OCCUR WITHIN THE TOWN, INCLUDING THOSE THAT ARE LESS OBVIOUS.

WHAT COULD BE THE VISION FOR THE LOCALS? WHAT COULD BE THE VISION FOR THE CLUBBERS? THE ALL-INCLUSIVE HOLIDAY-MAKERS?

IT REQUIRES CLEAR STRATEGIC THINKING TO UNDERSTAND NOT ONLY HOW AYIA NAPA OPERATES, AND ALSO HOW IT SITS WITHIN CYPRUS, PARTICULARLY THE SURROUNDING REGION. OBVIOUSLY, NO EASY TASK, WITH NO EASY SOLUTIONS: HOWEVER, AS A GROUP OF YOUNG DESIGNERS WE FEEL THAT IF WE WIDEN THE RANGE OF OUESTIONS IN OUR DESIGN PROCESS WE CAN AVOID THOSE "EASY SOLUTIONS" THAT OFTEN COME WITH LIMITED PROJECTS.

THE ROLE OF THE ARCHITECT

FOR THE PURPOSE OF THIS WORKSHOP, WE HAVE SET OUT TO UNDERSTAND, AND MAKE CLEAR, THE IMPORTANT FACTORS THAT COULD DECIDE AYIA NAPA'S FATE. WE AIM TO HIGHLIGHT CONNECTIONS WITHIN THE EXISTING TOWN AND BEYOND, AND TO SHED LIGHT ON THE EXISTING HIDDEN QUALITIES FOUND WITHIN THIS TOWN.

WE HAVE SEEN EXAMPLES OF PUBLIC REALM PROJECTS THAT DON'T ENGAGE WITH THE WIDER ISSUES, PARTICULARLY LOCAL STAKEHOLDERS, AND WHICH DON'T, UPON CLOSER INSPECTION, STIMULATE REAL AND LASTING GROWTH.

WORKSHOP

AS OUR STARTING POINT, WE SPLIT INTO 4 GROUPS, EACH USING A DISTINCT LOCATION WITHIN AYIA NAPA.

SOME OF THE PROJECTS CREATED AN INSPIRED VISION FOR THIS PARTICULAR AREA, WHILST OTHERS USED THIS STARTING POINT AS A WAY TO CHALLENGE AND QUESTION THE REASON FOR, AND THE NATURE OF, REDEVELOPMENT IN THIS COASTAL AREA.

GROUP 1: LOOKED AT THE WHOLE TOWN OF AYIA NAPA, PRIMARILY TOURISM.



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E AS A CATALYST FOR REGERATION

: VEGETATION AND WATER.

Landscape has been used as a starting point in the identification process by supporting the two main natural resources, the low and dry vegetation, the green and dense vegetation and the water feeding environment. Constructing both structures as part of the natural heritage of Ayia Napa, being the low vegetation found on the site. One of the main goals is to extend the green core of scatrered green in a form of a green spine towards the old historical village center.

The water element is related to the sustainable process of gathering and retaining rainwater in a system that will irrigate the green landscape.

Moreover the second step, after the connection of the two main elements to the green core, is to create new potencial space, either related to buildings or open spaces. Using the two main tools mentioned above, they trigger the senses, create microclimates an enable new functions in the urban

One example of the application of the general strategie correspond to the space around the monastery, where "flipping the square" on the north to the east of the site, was an important action, in order to simultaneously buffers the space trigger the visitors senses, create microclimates and screens the nightlife area. By positioning the new square in order to open up the new core of the town, new flows of people are enhanced from the seacost area towards the historical core during the

VOIDS AND PROGRAMME.

Using the unseen and underused urban fabric, culture and history of Ayia Napa as a point of departure, the scheme seeks to reveal the lost connection of a historic aqueduct to the monastery situated in the centre of the city.

> A partly elevated bridging structure is proposed to link the centre of Ayia Napa to the edge of the city where the aqueduct still stands, at once a symbolic gesture to the path once occupied by the aqueduct. The newly established path acts as a tool of reorientation and re-centrilization to shift the focus away from the existing hot spots of the

> Starting from the monastery as centre of education and culture the path rediscovers forgotten spaces in the urban fabric and revitalises them, transforming them into open spaces, viewing platforms and flexible multifunctional point of congregation. The path derminates at the other point of historical inportance, the aqueduct.



REDEFINING THE TOPOGRAPHY.



Tactical interventions for redifining the cultural heritage in the old village, around the monastery of Ayia Napa was started by analysis of the inbetween spaces, and their relationship to the topography. These have been fragmented by disorganised development. In the proposal the strategy is to re-establish continuity through flow of space and people, vegetation, views and new paths. The project proposes a continuous ribbon as a tool for creating an identity of the place. The idea is to unify the areas by using natural flows of the open spaces in Ayla Napa. It works as a transformable element, which chang-es from steps to seats, shaded spec to panoramic views, platforms,etc., as it flows around the old town, reawakining the topographical characteristics and designing pockets of meaning.
















































